
Cincinnati Live Cam

When you're asked about a subject, refer to it and pull out that resource. The USCG recently inspected some of our vessel's security plans. They want to see you use that book and that you know how to use it. They want to see you look up the definition and the page that addresses the subject asked. Be confident in your knowledge and training! Use the resources that you're provided.

Safety Tip

Cold Weather

When exposed to cold temperatures, your body begins to lose heat faster than it can be produced, which can lead to frostbite and, in extreme cases, hypothermia. To ward this off, we need to dress warmly, layer up (the air between layers provides thermal protection), wear dry clothing and attempt to reduce the time exposed to wind. Try not to have any skin exposed, which means you may want to wear a face mask/balaclava (I know you hunters have them). If, during the course of refueling one of our pumps (or even your own vehicle), you should get gasoline on you, you need to clean it off IMMEDIATELY. Gasoline evaporates very quickly, lowering the temperature of the skin and making it more susceptible to frostbite.

Nothing new here guys – just a reminder. Think about what you're doing, do what you're thinking about.
